Course Description

This course will introduce students to the language and culture of German-speaking countries, using both prepared and authentic materials with theme-related vocabulary and grammatical structures. Students will have the opportunity to practice listening, reading, writing, and speaking in German through in-class activities and homework assignments.

The program of the course corresponds to the Level A1 (Elementary) of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR), a widely accepted European standard for language proficiency.

By the end of the semester students will be able to:

- understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type
- introduce themselves and others and can ask and answer questions about personal details such as where he/she lives, people
 they know and things they have
- interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly and clearly and is prepared to help.

More specifically, students will be able to:

- · talk about themselves, their families, and their origins
- · talk about weather and clothing
- order food and drinks in a restaurant or a café, discuss food and cooking, use cooking recipes
- discuss different living situations, talk about houses, rooms, etc.
- talk about their time and make appointments
- orient themselves in a German-speaking urban setting and ask for directions
- talk about things that happened in the past;
- · talk about professions, job, study, recreation, and daily life
- talk about some major landmarks and places of interest of the German-speaking countries
- · talk about health and health issues
- · express their intentions, obligations and necessities.

The course is taught in German with some explanation of grammar points in English.

Each chapter covers a grammar point: i.e., a part of speech (noun, verb, pronoun), a word's function in a sentence (subject, direct object, indirect object), or a grammatical term (tense, conjugation, declension, gender). It explains both German and English grammars as they relate to each other and points out similarities, differences, and explains typical difficulties.

Course Requirements

Class Participation • 15%

Active class participation is crucial for language learning. The following are the rubrics for participation:

Homework Assignments • 15%

 The assignments will automatically close after the deadline; students who have not submitted the assignment will automatically get a zero grade for that assignment.
- Note: There will be homework assignments not listed on the Syllabus given by the instructor during class.

☑ Vocabulary Quizzes • 10%

Learning vocabulary is a crucial part of mastering a language. In the beginning of each class session students will write a 3-minute quiz based on the vocabulary portion learned for that day. The Syllabus contains links to online quizlets for learning and reviewing vocabulary for each session.

Oral Tests • 15%

During the semester students will complete three speaking tasks of increasing length and complexity that will be recorded outside the classroom using the online tool *Vocaroo* (http://vocaroo.com) and sent to the instructor by e-mail. The detailed instructions for each oral test will be uploaded on Sakai. These tasks will allow the students to demonstrate their breadth of vocabulary, fluency, comprehensibility, and mastery of grammar structures.

1-Credit Introductory German Courses

The two courses below are designed primarily for students enrolled in Elementary German 101 and 102. Both are 1-credit courses and have no exam at the end. Both of these courses will give the students an additional opportunity to practice German at an introductory level.

103 • German for Travel • Wednesdays 2:50 PM – 4:10 • AB-2200

This course will introduce you to the language and culture of German-speaking countries focusing on the language competencies particularly relevant in travel situations. You will learn to speak about yourself in general and as traveler; ask basic travel questions; discuss your travel interests; learn about German-speaking countries and their inhabitants; orient yourself regarding the means of transportation and accommodations used in Europe; and learn to purchase tickets and book hotel rooms on German-language websites.

104 • German Conversation • Thursdays 1:10 – 2:30 • SC-201

This course will introduce you to the language and culture of German-speaking countries focusing on the language competencies particularly relevant for oral communication in everyday situations. You will learn how to speak about yourself; ask basic questions; share basic information about your family and relatives; speak about your studies; speak about objects relevant to everyday situations; speak about the weather; and express your likes and dislikes.
