## Course Description

The course is a continuation of German 101. We will continue the introduction to the language and cultures of German-Speaking countries, using both prepared and authentic materials with theme-related vocabulary and grammatical structures. Students will have the opportunity to practice listening, reading, writing, and speaking in German through in-class activities and homework assignments.

Some of the topics addressed this semester include housing, ordering food at restaurants, appropriate communication when in need of medical assistance, familiarity with the fall of the Berlin Wall and German reunification, appreciation of German art, literature, and music. By the end of the semester students will be able to:

- talk about housing issues and housework;
- discuss health choices and what to do when in need of medical assistance;
- talk about shopping and ordering food at restaurants;
- talk about family and community issues in a multicultural society;
- describe
- talk about the past and historic events;

The course likewise aims to expand the student's vocabulary and knowledge of German grammar.

demonstrate their breadth of vocabulary, fluency, comprehensibility, and ability to use grammatical structures.
