- Course objective: This course develops the reading skills for students who wish to acquire a basic competence in the German language for research purpose. Texts read in class and at home are chosen from the humanities, the natural sciences, and the social sciences.
- This course does not serve as a prerequisite for German 131 or 132 !***
- Requirements: In order to improve reading skills in a foreign language, you need to constantly expand your vocabulary and be exposed to a variety of texts from different disciplines. Your requirement for this class will include daily homework assignments such as studying the vocabulary, applying the new structures in exercises, and reading sample texts. Homework assignments are therefore due on the day that they are listed in your syllabus or mentioned in class. Late homework assignments will not be accepted for credit. Each chapter begins with explanations and examples of the grammar, and is followed by corresponding exercises and a sample reading. Class time will be used to discuss the exercises and to explain typical problems found in the different sentences and texts.
- Attendance: All students must attend regularly and arrive prepared; if you expect to miss one or two classes, please use the University absence reporting website <https://sims.rutgers.edu/ssra/> to indicate the date and Reason for your absence. An email is automatically sent to me. Those who miss more than two class sessions without a compelling excuse (a doctor's or college

dean's note, e.g.) should expect a one-step reduction in the course grade (i.e. an A becomes a B+, a B+ becomes a B). Three late arrivals count as one absence. Note: It is the responsibility of students who have been absent (for any reason) to find out what they have missed and obtain materials that may have been handed out.
