Course Description: Students will further develop their German language skills, by discussing a variety of cultural topics and themes in the German-speaking world. Through extensive work on expanding vocabulary, reviewing major grammar topics, conversation and composition exercises, students will strengthen their language skills and develop cultural competency. The course focuses on real communication in meaningful contexts, to develop and consolidate students' speaking, listening, reading and writing abilities at the intermediate level.

Using a variety of media, such as texts, video, and audio, students will explore the course's five major themes: Traditions & Specialties, Science & Technology, Law & Environment, Economy & Job opportunities, and History & Society. Students will have the opportunity to practice and improve their spoken and written German skills through in-class activities and homework assignments.

The course is taught in German. Active and dedicated participation including homework is expected.

Course Requirements and Assignments:

Homework: All homework listed in the syllabus must be completed online on the date indicated. Please note that for each day that an assignment is overdue 10% of its score will be deducted. Note: There will be homework assignment not listed on the syllabus given by the instructor during class.

Essays: Students will write essays after each chapter theme (Schreibwerkstatt) using vocabulary and structures learned in class. Essays are graded on 1) communicative comprehensibility, 2) quality of the content/information/analysis, 3) use and range of vocabulary, 4) grammatical accuracy, including spelling, capitalization, and correct use of German characters [e.g., ä, ö, ü, ß]. Please **type** your essays (**font 12 & double-spaced**). Your revised essay attached to your first draft is due by the next class. The two will be averaged for a final grade. No late work will be accepted unless you have arranged in advance for an extension. If the deadline is missed the original grade will be kept. Use of a translation engine will be considered cheating (see Academic Integrity Policy)

Chapter Tests: At the end of each chapter you will complete a written and an oral test at home and are due by the date listed in the syllabus.
