German Media and Society

Course Description: The aim of this course is to actively develop your language skills and cultural awareness through the study of the role of various media (including print, internet, film, and the other arts) in informing contemporary German politics and society. Texts and presentations will be chosen to accommodate language level of students enrolled. By the end of the semester, students will be able to talk about certain aspects in Germany's political and cultural life. This course may be repeated. Course credits may be counted toward the German major and minor.

Prerequisites: Successful completion of German 102 or equivalent grade on placement test. *Course taught in German*.

Textbook: No textbook is required for the course. However, you are expected to invest in a good German-English dictionary (electronic or otherwise) and bring it regularly to class. See schedule below for more details about the course material.

Attendance: All students must attend regularly and arrive prepared; if you expect to miss one or two classes, please use the University absence reporting website https://sims.rutgers.edu/ssra/ to indicate the date and reason for your absence. An email is automatically sent to me. Those who miss more than two class sessions without a compelling excuse should expect a one-step reduction in the course grade (i.e. an A becomes a B+, a B+ becomes a B). Three late arrivals count as one absence. Note: It is the responsibility of students who have been absent (for any reason) to find out what they have missed and obtain materials that may have been handed out.

Photocopies: Department photocopying fees add up quickly and impressively; we will therefore need to collect from each student 5 cents per page toward the cost of handouts other than quizzes and tests.

Class participation and discussion: 60% (*This would be based on the weekly readings mentioned in the syllabus and would also include any additional homework assignments.*)

Class Discussion: Active participation in class, based on the readings, will be an essential component of this course. Please ensure that you complete all the readings and look up relevant vocabulary to ensure that you're prepared for class discussions.

Presentations: One short presentation (approximately 5-7 minutes, in German) on your response to one of the texts/themes listed in the syllabus. While the presentation may be not read, flashcards may be used.

Homework: Homework assignments consist primarily of the readings specified on the syllabus. This would include looking up relevant vocabulary and being prepared to summarize and discuss the readings. *Additional homework not listed on the syllabus may be assigned in class*.

Final Exam: The final exam will be based on the themes discussed in class and will be held from **8pm-11pm on Wednesday**, **9**th **May**, **2012**.

The instructor reserves the right to make changes to the syllabus.

Important! No textbook is required for this course (except for a German-English dictionary). Links to the relevant texts/videos have been given below. Please note, however, that these texts will often be used in an abridged or simplified form (based on the language level of the class). You should ensure that you read the correct version based on announcements in class and on Sakai.
