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Graduate Seminar Spring 2017

Nervous Systems Gender, Literature, Technology (1895-1933)

Course Description:

This course examines the modernist predicament as nervous system, which contains various modalities of failure and collapse: Aphasia and addiction, the incarcerated subject, the decentered self and the teenager, liminality and poverty, hysteria and schizophrenia, apocalypse, suicide, and war.

We will be looking at these tropes and theories in regard to specific gender and media technologies that are being employed and by doing so, combine pertinent literary and critical works of the time between 1895 and 1933 with more recent theories: Deleuze's Coldness and Cruelty will be read together with Sacher-Masoch and Robert Walser; Butler's Bodies That Matter with Fontane's Effi Briest and the sex tragedies of Wedekind and Kokoschka; Ronell's The Telephone Book with Lasker-Schüler and Trakl; Freud's "Fragments of an Analysis of a Case of Hysteria" with the works of Schnitzler, Zürn, and Cixous; Derrida's "No Apocalypse, Not Now" with Futurist manifestos; and Kittler's Gramophone, Film, Typewriter with Rilke's "Primal Sound," the fantasy tales of Mynona, and early silent cinema.

Taught in English. Readers of German and/or French are encouraged to read the texts in German. Advanced undergraduate students may take this course with the approval of the Undergraduate Director.

Course Requirements: 1 class presentation, 20. min (20%), 2 response papers, 3pp. each (20%), and 1 final research paper, 15pp. (60%).

Learning Goals: (1) Students will demonstrate familiarity with a variety of texts mainly related to the German tradition as well as methods of studying literature and culture in relation to pertinent theoretical readings and evaluate the nature, function and value of literature from a critical perspective. (2) Students will analyze a specific body of research and write a clear and well-developed paper or project about a topic related to more than one literary and cultural tradition.
